



Picnic & Tour at Paramount Ranch

The last week end of September, 2016 proved to be a fun filled adventure for Safarians who attended the first Annual **Car Corral and Picnic** at Paramount Ranch in Southern California. The weather was perfect and the gathering place was one of the most unique venues that you will ever find—a historic movie ranch & 50s era raceway! Equally impressive was the fact that the event was sponsored by the National Park Service—a first time event ever conducted by that agency!

This was no ordinary car show. In fact, the event was not really about the cars, it was about having a picnic in a park and enjoying tours of the historic movie western town and raceway. Participants took the opportunity to attend ranger led tours and movie presentations that were offered throughout the morning and early afternoon. The event was limited to 80 vehicles and they were allowed to park on the historic raceway and Western Town. More than 400 people enjoyed the event. Attending Safarians included Aspen Pittman, Mike Green, Marvin Morton, Randy Kerdoon and Bill Baquet & his family. Tom Young not only attended but he helped create and produce the event while working as a volunteer for the National Park Service. Tom arrived early to set up displays and park cars. He conducted presentations on the historic movies produced at the ranch that featured automobiles. He also led a short hike along the raceway with a former race car driver who raced at Paramount Ranch. Everyone had a great time learning about movie and racing history.

Paramount Ranch was established back in 1927 as one of Hollywood's most successful movie ranches. Famous classic movies such as the 1930s "Adventures of Huckleberry Fin and classic early TV series such as "The Cisco Kid" were filmed at Paramount Ranch. The Ranch was sold in 1943 and eventually was purchased by the National Park Service in 1980. During that time, many important events occurred at the ranch including the filming of the worlds first commercially successful 3-D movie in 1953, the "Bwana Devil". In 1956, a race track was built next to the Western Town movie set. The 2 mile curving track featured high banked turns and a figure eight bridge crossing. Sports and stock car races were held for two years. During that time, famous race car drivers including Sam Hanks, Troy Ruttman, Dan Gurney and others won races there. Today, Paramount Ranch continues to be used for filming movies, commercials, TV show series, weddings and large public events. The next Car Corral & Picnic will be scheduled in September.

We started our day by gathering in the morning at McKinley's Grill at the Sheraton Hotel. We ate a lot of tacos! The prices were reasonable and the service was good. After our tasty lunch, we walked to the Mecum Auction gate. By walking, we saved on parking fees and we avoided traffic congestion. Nice! The auction stage was located on the big Fairplex building next to the NHRA museum. There was not a lot of spectator room in the building so we casually passed through the bidding area.

Nearby, we stopped to take a close look at two cars that immediately struck our interest, a Kenya Ivory & Fountane Blue '57 Bonneville and a dark red '56 Windsor convertible. Bob called the '56 Windsor just as it should be....."bad ass"! I am not sure if the colors were correct for the car but it sure did look great! The '57 Bonneville was not the same one that was recently auctioned at Barrett-Jackson in Scottsdale. Both shared one common characteristic, the leather seats were a few color tones too dark



from the factory look. Bob quickly noticed that the Pomona Bonneville lower quarter panel trim was restored improperly and we noticed that a lot of detail work was missing under the hood. This was not a top-dollar Bonneville but it was certainly a very nice car that everyone could appreciate. Bidding the car reached 120K which was not enough for a sale. The '56 Windsor was sold at 77K. Much to our surprise, we found auction vehicles in all 7 Fairplex halls. Many vehicles auctioned on Friday were already gone but some cars remained. One of my favorites was a '58 Chrysler 300D convertible. It had an older restoration that was showing some age but it still looked great. Bidding went to 70K for the car but fell under the owner's reserve. Station wagons continue to hold their own values. A '54 Chrysler Town & Country wagon restored to a very high standard was bided up to 50K; not bad for a stogy wagon.

Back to the past in Northern California



Technical Tips #1

Some of the most important components of your Safari wagon are the dash board controls and gauges. As we drive our wagons, we are constantly looking our gauges. Unrestored gauges will always distract from that new car feeling. Short of having your gauges restored by a professional and often expensive service provider, you

can dramatically create a fresh appearance by painting the indicators back to their factory fresh color. You can do it yourself! Just use Testors Hobby Paint enamel #1127 Orange. It's a great color match to the color used by GM. The color was used on dash board gauges, clocks and radio dial indicators.

Be sure to properly clean the surface of the indicator before painting. A cotton tip lightly soaked with alcohol will work.

What to buy: **TESTORS ENAMEL #1127 ORANGE**, 1/4 fl oz.; FINE PAINT BRUSH

Where to buy: MOST HOBBY STORES, EBAY.

How to apply: CLEAN OFF DIRT & LOOSE PAINT WITH ALCOHOL. APPLY WITH

FINE PAINT BRUSH or to save money, USE A TOOTH PICK OR PAPER

CLIP. Really, they will work with a steady hand!


